

## "Simple Gifts"

Early literacy skills begin at birth. Talking, reading and singing with your child will help him/her develop essential pre-reading and pre-writing skills.

Talking	<ul> <li>Look at your child when you are talking to him/her.</li> <li>Use short sentences and simple words when you are describing common objects.</li> <li>Take turns: talk to your child and wait for a response.</li> <li>Listen to your child and then imitate or expand on your child's sounds/words.</li> <li>Talk to your baby in your first language while changing diapers, feeding and cuddling.</li> </ul>
Reading	<ul> <li>While you hold your child in your lap, share a book.</li> <li>Turn the pages slowly and point to the pictures in the book.</li> <li>Use words that describe the colours and shapes of the objects on each page.</li> <li>Set a time each day to read with your child.</li> <li>Look for books made of cloth, or vinyl and board books about colours, shapes and familiar objects.</li> <li>Join a special baby program at your local Best Start Hub.</li> </ul>
Singing	<ul> <li>Listen to children's music at home or in the car.</li> <li>Learn the words and tunes so you can sing them anywhere or anytime.</li> <li>Comfort your baby by singing during a 'fussy time' and to distract your little one during diaper changes or bath time.</li> <li>Borrow other music CD's or audiocassettes from your local library, Best Start Hub or trade with family and friends.</li> <li>Teach your child about beat and rhythm while having fun by singing and dancing together.</li> </ul>
